"Seeing is Believing" Our Stained Glass Windows - continued


Remember that Bethesda is built on the "cruciform principle". The floor of the church makes a perfect design of the cross. Starting at the pulpit "crossing of the Cross", then we have the vertical arms of the Cross.

After Apostle Paul, moving on through church history, we come to our own John Wesley - the scholar and founder of the Methodist movement in England's 18th century. Since he was a man of fervent prayer, the small symbol at the bottom is that of hands clasped in prayer.

Beside Wesley stands Francis Asbury, whom Wesley sent to establish Methodism in the New World. He is dressed in the boots of the American frontier and is said to have traveled 268,000 miles on horseback in his ministry. Thus, his symbol is that of a Methodist Circuit Rider. Asbury supervised thousands of Riders during early American.

Speaking of transportation, it was John Wesley who once said, as he was approaching 80 years of age - that the only concession he was making to age was that he was "now going to travel in a horse and buggy"!

Centennial Walk

Sunday, June 4th is here! The 100 year celebration of our church building will be begin with a "centennial" walk" commemorating the move from the former Broad Street location of our church to the current building that we know as Bethesda United Methodist Church. Here are some details for your consideration.

The walk is approximately 0.3 miles and should take less than 20 minutes for most to complete. Participants need to arrive at the Boundless Playground at Poplar Hill Ave. and Broad St. (next to the Chipman Center) before **9:40 AM** and ready to begin the walk promptly at 9:45 am. Our walking route will take us west on Walnut St. from the playground then north on North Division St. to the church. We will have a police escort to ensure our safety.

As parking at the playground is very limited (and you don't want to leave your vehicle there during the worship service!), please consider parking at the "Oaks" parking lot and walking to the playground if at all possible. This option may actually save you some time! Otherwise, all passengers should be dropped off at the playground. Drivers can then proceed to the church parking lot by the ramp door where a limited "shuttle service" will be provided to return you to the playground site. Please be sure to allow ample time to get to the playground before 9:40 am.

If you are not able to actually walk, then consider gathering outside in front of the church building shortly before 10:00 am to watch the procession and greet the walkers as they arrive! It should be an inspiring sight!


And one other celebration in June...Nikko will be turning 13 on June 29. I am so proud of him and his service to Bethesda as a go-to acolyte!
